

Lines of research inquiry

Undergraduate and seminary student research

Although intermediary students will be encouraged to write exploratory papers on relevant topics, these papers may not be publishable. The primary line of work for these students will lie with the transcription of relevant witnesses to the Greek Psalter, including but not limited to GC.MS. 170.

Graduate student research

Although graduates students will be encouraged to interact directly with the images of the manuscripts as well as the broader issues of paleography, mentors will collaborate with these advanced students to explore the nature of the text itself within the context of the wider tradition of the Psalms. The end products of this research should be publishable, and may be form the subject of a master's or doctoral dissertation.

1. Paleography

- a) Analysis of the Greek style in light of similar informal round hands
- b) Scribal habits (*nomina sacra*, punctuation, errors)

2. History

- a) Stichometry and order of the Psalter (cf. William Yarchin)
- b) The context of the Dishna Papers
- c) Citations of the OG Psalms in the New Testament (textual affiliation and exegetical significance)

3. Textual analysis

- a) Rahlfs' "Upper Egyptian" group and GC.MS. 170
- b) Daughter versions (Armenian, Coptic, Ethiopic, Latin, "Syro-Hexaplaric")
- c) Review of Rahlfs' textual groupings
- d) Comparison with the Hexapla, Church Fathers and other Old Greek traditions
- e) Comparison with known Hebrew texts (Masoretic and Qumran)
- f) Translation technique
